


# Heart of a Coach – December 2011

**Why did you choose that particular passage?**

As coaches, we are constantly being scrutinized by players, parents, administrators, media, and the community. Great leadership does not give into the demands, expectations, and criticism of the public. Instead, great leadership is about seeking God's advice and doing what is right as a Christian coach. Coaches cannot make decisions based upon trying to please people. When their head hits the pillow at night they must know that they led in a way that honors Christ. That should be our leadership goal as Christian coaches.

**Please give an application/example of this word in your life.**

As a coach, teacher, and parent I am often faced with conflict and adversity. How I respond to conflict defines me as a leader. We have a saying among the varsity baseball staff at Mason City High School that says, "Stay above the fray." We use that as a reminder to not get caught up in the heat of the moment or gossip. Instead, we try to "stay above the fray" as leaders.

**How do you apply this word in your sport?**

One of my assistant coaches, Jason Parker, has a son the same age as mine (12). Carson and Jake both play on the same travel baseball team also coached by Jason and me. Early on we both found ourselves getting too caught up in the competitiveness of the game with our kids involved. We were not being the Christian leaders we wanted to be. So, we started fist pounding each other before every game while saying the phrase, "For him." This reminded us that our first priority in all games should be to use the game to further God's kingdom. That's first and foremost. We started doing it before every varsity baseball game as well. In fact, the last thing we said to each other before last summer's 4A State Championship Game against West Des Moines Dowling was, "For him!"

**How did you become involved in FCA?**

One of the greatest blessings I have ever experienced was when God placed Dan Mason in my life. Dan is the athletic director at North Iowa Area Community College and is also my assistant varsity baseball coach at Mason City High School. Dan is a Christian first and foremost. He walks the walk. Dan has a long history with FCA. Dan and I started a coaches' huddle in Mason City a few years ago and that grew into our campus huddle at Mason City High School. My relationship with Dan has been an amazing blessing. I am a better husband, father, teacher, coach, and Christian as a result of my relationship with Dan Mason.

I am the campus huddle leader at Mason City High School. I also recently began helping another father in our community start a 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade student huddle at Mason City High School on Sunday nights. I played varsity basketball and baseball at Mason City High School for Bob Horner. Bob is a member of the Iowa HS Basketball Hall of Fame. **What is your coaching experience?**

I actually started out as more of a basketball guy than baseball. In fact, I still don't know which sport I like coaching better.
